Bloom is not standing still


The BloomLab at St Cat's is in its second year and growing at a rapid rate. Since the start of 2015, over 3000 attendees have participated in 100 Bloom events which include the workshop series Skills uni won't teach you. 40 startups have now been supported by Bloom and with a strategic target to have 200 startups established by 2018, the Bloom team is not standing still!

CEO of Bloom Mark Shelton says, "It's fantastic to see how quickly Bloom's message is spreading - we're seeing so many young people who had never considered starting a business or nonprofit having a go and, in many cases, having some serious success. The young entrepreneurs we work with are proving again and again that age is no barrier to making an impact."






RELAY FOR LIFE

Dr Ellen Fortini Director: Student Development and Learning



As Director of Student Development and Learning, I assist students to identify and access the skills and resources that will allow them to excel in their studies. I coordinate the *Transition to University* program, which delivers practical workshops and other events that develop skills in academic performance, health and wellbeing and networking. I am also available to assist residents on a one-on-one basis and monitor their academic progress. St Catherine's College residents are from diverse backgrounds and tend to be far away from familial support, so this support ensures our residents have access to staff and student leaders, so they can be successful.

PROFILE OF **KELLY SUN**- DIRECTOR OF STUDIES

Biochemistry researcher, Kelly Sun has been appointed to the position of Director of Studies - responsible for designing and delivering the College tutorial system.

The program has gone from strength to strength with the College offering over 110 weekly, unit specific tutorials. Residents of the College can both request and participate in tutorials as well as tutor in the program. This partnership encourages two-way learning and a deeper understanding of course content and core concepts.



TUTORIAL PROGRAM



The Academic Program is something that prompts many residents (and their parents) to choose St Catherine's College. This comprehensive and individualised flagship program offers everything our residents need to be successful at university and propel them into their future careers. Currently, over 110 unit specific tutorials are offered each week as part of the academic program. Most of the tutors are current or past residents, providing a unique opportunity for academically talented residents to contribute back to the St Catherine's community. Alumna, Eloise Ambrose, understands the value of the tutorial system.

The program was in its infancy when Eloise first came to St Catherine's but she was quick to take advantage of the opportunity and participated in tutorials from her first year at College.

My tutor was able to highlight the information we didn't know and being in a small group with other students doing the same unit, I felt I wasn't alone, something I think is really important for first year residents.

Now in the final year of her double degree in Economics and International Relations and having completed a diploma in Italian, Eloise is in a position to contribute to the tutorial program from a different perspective. Eloise is back at St Catherine's to tutor students in two units, USA Politics and Marketing. Ali Behjat and Kristen Seton, two first year residents, are the beneficiaries of her experience and her knowledge.

Ali's participation in the tutorial program is really helping him adjust to university study, "Eloise thoroughly understands the unit I'm doing and she is able to get straight to the point when explaining a concept" says Ali. "She also has a lively personality, which makes the tutorials an enjoyable experience and encourages me to stay on top of the material."

LINDERGRADUATES

FACULTY NIGHTS OPEN DOORS FOR RESIDENTS

Developing skills in communication and active networking is something scores of students grapple with, and whilst our undergraduates appreciate the benefit of these skills, what they really want is the opportunity to practice them.

Faculty Nights give St Catherine's residents a unique opportunity to develop these critical skills and begin to build their professional networks.

Each semester, residents invite their favourite lecturers, academics or professionals from their field of interest to join them at a Faculty Dinner. A topical guest speaker, carefully structured seating arrangements to maximise discussion and a gourmet three course meal are a winning formula. During the evening, residents are able to meet a range of people who have built successful careers in their field and having personal access to these professionals is an incredibly rich experience for them.





Danah Hourani, St Catherine's alumna and 2015 President, was able to use the Faculty Nights to begin to build her professional network and kick-start her career in research. During the final year of her Bachelor of Science, Danah recounts being particularly inspired by and interested in the research undertaken in Professor Mathew Martin-Iverson's lab, which focuses on the pharmacological effects of Cannabanoids and Dexamphetamines.

However, even in third year it is sometimes difficult to catch up with your lecturers, "He was always running between classes, so I never got the chance to have a normal, unhurried conversation with him". Danah invited Professor Martin-Iverson to the Faculty Night where they were able to speak about his research and Danah's interest in possible honours

projects. Danah is now pursuing her honours' research in his lab where she is working towards gaining a better understanding of the symptoms and underlying mechanisms of schizophrenia as a psychotic disease.

MAX CHAPMAN

- UNDERGRADUATE RESIDENT PROFILE

Max Chapman, a first year student, majoring in Engineering and Physics at UWA is also the recipient of a UWA Bachelor of Philosophy (BPhil) Scholarship and a St Catherine's Scholarship. His decision to choose to live at St Catherine's was influenced by his mother, a lecturer at Murdoch University, who attended a Faculty Dinner last year as a guest and was impressed by the facilities and programs on offer. Max did his own research, which supported his mother's advice and he is now a committed member of our College community.

CORAL IS COOL

Coral aquaculture, also known as coral farming or coral gardening, is the cultivation of corals for commercial purposes or coral reef restoration. Aquaculture is showing promise as a potentially effective tool for restoring coral reefs, which have been declining around the world.

Onika Basile, a 1st Year Marine Science student, lives and breathes coral farming and she effusively explains how working with her mother and father, Tracey and Andrew, on their coral farm in Geraldton is the most exciting thing imaginable. For a young woman embarking on a tertiary education, she is incredibly knowledgeable about the industry and can describe the fragility in which these ecosystems survive in minute detail.

Her family, which has Italian heritage, were originally cray fisherman off the coast of Geraldton. Her childhood was focussed on the fishing season and for ten years, Onika and her family lived on a small island for three months each year. She laughs at the presumption that it may have been like camping on holiday with your family. "Oh no, it is hard work and we quickly learnt that being busy outside meant less arguments inside! It was a special time in my life. Dad has been coming out here ever since he was born as my Grandfather was also a cray fisherman and Mum began coming out here when she met Dad."

The crayfish business became less and less viable and through sheer ingenuity and tenacity her family began coral farming as an alternative. They produce sustainable corals which are sent to aquariums and oceanariums all over Australia and overseas. "The coral ecosystems are very fragile and they need specific conditions in which to thrive. Aquariums offer more controlled environments with the right PH levels, water temperature and water quality." says Onika. Demand for coral is high and depends on the type of coral and how rare it is.

As concern in the marine biology community grows around the bleaching and death of coral reefs around Australia, the work Onika and her family are doing is both cutting edge and vital in sustaining our natural legacy.



The set-up for holding corals are large, steel frames which are placed underwater with feet that prevent them from sinking into sand. The corals are connected by plastic tubes.

Eleisha was raised in Derby, in the Kimberley Region of WA and comes from a closely-knit family that avidly supports her learning. Eleisha strongly identifies as a Djugun woman and believes that "being an Indigenous person at St Catherine's has been a beautiful experience because our culture is wellreceived and respected here."

For Eleisha, her involvement in the Dandjoo Darbalung program and the Res Council have been enriched because of the diversity present at the College and because she has been proactive in embracing the opportunities available to her.

I have wanted to play an active role in making others' College experience a positive one because I have had such a great experience at St Cat's. Spending my formative years in a diverse, culturally rich environment has changed me as a person and I am incredibly proud of this community.

TO THE WORKING WORLD - PROFESSIONAL MENTORING





The commencement of the St Catherine's College Professional Mentoring Program, a newly developed program, was marked by a Launch event in early April. The program is open to all students in their third year of study or above, who are matched with a professional mentor from their intended career industry. The purpose of the program is for student mentees to seek information and advice to assist them transition successfully into the workforce.

Mentors come from a wide range of industries and are either professionals currently connected to the College (such as the College Fellows) or can be nominated by the mentees and other residents.

Recent graduate and now Alumnus of the College, Junran Cao, participated in the pilot of the program last year. He was matched with David Smith, Deputy Director General: Economic and Deregulation (Dept Premier and Cabinet). Junran is now working in the Department of Justice in Victoria and on the benefits of the mentoring relationship he says, "During our conversations last year, David was able to illuminate me on the skills that are currently in demand and the topical trends in research. It not only helped to clarify my understanding but it is also something that I have continued to lean on in my current role as an analyst."

Several other students have gone on to secure graduate positions, internships and highly coveted spots in research teams with the assistance of their mentors.


PARTNERS WITH THE COLLEGE

Understanding the world around me is a very intriguing thought. Not many people know things like what causes hurricanes, or how a spinning core helps life on Earth. Between weather, Earth's formations, the creation of things from elements to planets, and the complex relationships between every science and every aspect of the universe is something I find really interesting.

Travis grew up in the US Virgin Islands but completed his schooling at a boarding school in New Hampshire which was a complete culture shock after a relatively carefree youth spent in board shorts playing beach volleyball during lunch. Dressed in a jacket and tie and learning new sports like Crew and Lacrosse were all part of the experience and eventually led him to Trinity University in San Antonio, Texas where he graduated with a BSc in Geoscience in 2015. "Texas turned out to be a great fit and I quickly discovered geology as a major! Texas has fantastic camping grounds and beautiful landscapes from the mountains in the West to the beaches in the East and a vast desert in between. Geology involves being outside and understanding the places around us. The world is too my real love was with water and how it interacts with the Earth. It is so different from other mineral compounds and has huge effects on virtually everything. It is also a resource that we literally couldn't live without so hopefully there will always be a demand for those who study it."

Travis loves to explore the world and after various field trips to places such as Hawaii, Oregon, Colorado and Mexico, he spent time with his sister in Beijing, China and travelled to Nanjing, Chingdu, Xian, Hong Kong and Guangzou. He has experienced a range of different jobs like labouring on an oilrig, teaching English to Chinese children, working in a brewery and helping on an archeological dig in Israel. With each job came the opportunity to travel which expanded his experiences and eventually drove him to further study in Perth.

When it comes to studying the geoscience fields you need to go where the geology is. Travis wants to study ground water and wants to be in a place that thrives off groundwater. "I was deciding between Iceland and Australia, it was a tough decision until I considered the lack of daylight they have during the winter so the beautiful weather tipped the scale in Perth's favour. At the end of the day I want to do something that has an impact on people and on the environment. Water is an important resource and messing with its cycles has domino effects that can easily get out of hand and become catastrophic." says Travis.

VALE JACQUELINE

- A WOMAN OF SUBSTANCE

On 15 March this year, Jacqueline O'Brien (nee Wittenoom) passed away peacefully in Dublin in her 90th year. A woman of many parts, she was an accomplished author, photographer, businesswoman, philanthropist, the wife of legendary horse trainer Dr Vincent O'Brien and a beloved mother, grandmother and great-grandmother. She was also a notable alumna of St Catherine's College and was the first Student President of the University Women's College (now known as St Catherine's College) in 1947. Her ties to the College continue today as her granddaughter, Alexandra O'Brien, is a current resident.



Born in 1927, Jacqueline grew up on a sheep station near Albany. Growing up in a remote area, Jacqueline received her schoolbooks by train and her lessons via the radio and was eventually sent to board in Perth at the age of 11. She wanted to study Medicine but as there was no Medical Faculty in Perth at that time she considered moving to Adelaide. Her politician father, Charles Wittenoom, said positively 'no' so she settled on Economics and began her studies at the University of Western Australia, moving into St Catherine's College in her final year of her degree in 1946.

She remained in College for another year to complete her Honours and years later reflected, "The College was quite spartan and not exactly palatial. There was the relative grandeur of St George's College down the road but I don't remember ever envying those students. We had a room to ourselves and we shared bathrooms. We didn't have much furniture, just a bed, chair and a table but you didn't think "I'm being deprived". The meals were perfectly adequate and we were very grateful to be there at all."

After graduation Jacqueline secured a job with the Commonwealth Bank in Sydney before traveling to Ireland with her mother. Here she met her husband, Dr Vincent O'Brien, whom she married in 1951 and they moved to Ballydoyle in Co. Tipperary in Ireland. She spent most of the rest of her life there supporting her husband and her growing family as he built a horse training and breeding empire. She provided crucial support for Vincent and immersed herself in the business in her own way. Tasked to photograph the horses for sale and not one to be daunted by the unknown, Jacqueline bought herself a Roloflex camera and started taking photos of the horses and the trainers and their families. She enjoyed the creativity and honed her skills producing exhibitions in Dublin, Limerick, New York and Paris. She later specialised in interior and landscape photography and of course, horses.

She loved to write and authored seven books, taking the photographs for most of them herself. Her final book was a tribute to AH Stone, Western Australia's earliest photographer.

Jacqueline remained close to her old friends from University including College Fellow, Margaret Medcalf who was at the Women's College with her and Jacqueline appreciated what those early years meant, "The education I have been lucky enough to receive has stood by me all my life. If I hadn't had such great advantages I think that I would have been less able to handle all the different kinds of situations I've been in. I also think knowledge gives you a great appetite for more and that it is really important to feel that nothing is impossible."

Marketing student, Isabella Leandri, chatted to Alexandra about her grandmother.

"My grandmother was a woman with many admirable traits and talents. She just had such a zest for life and learning and had this incredible ability to set her mind on something and achieve it in a

short amount of time. She lived her life to the fullest, with a determination and fortitude that has inspired me through my life."

He is currently working for a state government on a telecommunications strategy which has been uniquely challenging and rewarding for



HUMBLED BY GENEROSITY - MARISA DUONG

High academic achiever, St Catherine's and Forrest scholarship recipient and Alumna of the College, Marisa Duong shares her journey.

Marisa came to Australia from Vietnam at the end of 2008 with limited English, so she had to first do a High School English preparation course for 10 weeks. She went into Year 10 at Kalamunda Senior High School and did exceedingly well in her ATAR, being accepted into the first cohort of the Bachelor of Philosophy (Honours) in 2012. She officially graduated in March this year and is currently pursuing her PhD in Biochemistry and Molecular Biology.

"I loved my time at St Cat's and I was very fortunate to be able to reside at the College during the two most crucial years of undergraduate studies. The fact the College is right opposite UWA meant that every

day, I could save several hours of travelling to take part in more meaningful activities like volunteering, tutoring, learn more life skills and ultimately, benefit from such a rich the community. There are many things I value about College - I valued St Cat's academic program, which I actively participated in as a tutor as well as a student. I was also truly inspired by and grateful for such a kind and devoted Head of College, Fiona Crowe. Her amazing leadership boosted the positivity and well-being of us all and together with other dedicated College staff I always felt I was encouraged to be the best I could be."

Marisa acknowledges that without the generosity of donors, she would not have had the academic opportunities she has had and her life would have been vastly different.

"I think philanthropy is noble, because educational systems benefit as a whole and quality education can be provided to those who are keen to learn despite their personal circumstances. Top universities in the world all

receive significant public endowments, and the University of Western Australia is no exception."

have received philanthropic

and more recently, the Forrest
Scholarship is allowing me to
pursue my PhD. I am humbled
by the generosity and it fuels
my desire to give back to
society in the future.

Marisa's research aims to understand the mechanisms of devastating diseases such as Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy to enable timely and effective therapeutic interventions. Tissues in this diseased state tend to suffer from

a state of stress called "oxidative stress" which is similar to what happens when iron rusts and they are rendered dysfunctional. Her research project aims to develop techniques that discern which particular molecules are suffering from more oxidation to combat the dysfunction.

Marisa is a huge advocate for beneficial partnerships. "Learning such complex disease mechanisms at the molecular level involves multidisciplinary research where partnerships are indispensable. My supervisor collaborates with Proteomics International and also with researchers in other scientific fields to help us reach our research goals which benefits the community. With the advance of communication technologies and the increasing need for interdisciplinary collaborations between experts from different fields, a lot of current research partnerships span different countries. I believe that the demand for international partnerships will be ever-increasing as sharing knowledge and best-practice has never been easier or more important."









The UWA Alumni Fund supported a College proposal entitled "Growing Communities" to create a sustainable native garden area in the corridor of land between St Catherine's and Winthrop Avenue.

This shared space for community interaction and student learning also has improved habitat for birds and insects and provides a teaching backdrop for sustainable urban planning. The garden links into the College's Indigenous Access Program, Dandjoo Darbalung, and once the bush foods are established, will involve Indigenous elders and students teaching about "Bush Tucker" which can be grown, harvested and enjoyed.

This wonderful addition to the College was made possible by generous financial support and has immeasurably enriched the residents and the 'urban portal' to and from the university.
